Robin Benton Handbell Ringers of Great Britain

Robin Benton studied music at London University and has diplomas from two London music colleges.

During his career as a teacher, he ran a children's handbell and handchime group for 20 years. He has won national composing competitions organized by the Handbell Ringers of Great Britain, and his music has been played at both regional and national ringing events.

He has enjoyed conducting his music at International Handbell Symposiums in Brisbane (2006) and Liverpool (2012) and is delighted to be conducting his "Celebration for Bells" at this year's symposium.

Robin enjoys playing his trombone with Bath Community Big Band and is an active archer with the Bath Archery Club.

Lisa Kyriakides Handbell Musicians of Canada

Lisa Kyriakides is an experienced conductor, educator, clinician, soloist, musical director, and adjudicator. She lives in Ontario, Canada with her husband and two daughters. Lisa is the director of the Handbell program at Aurora United Church, which includes conducting two four-octave choirs, Faith-A-Peal and Bellissimo, and being a member of the EmBellished Handbell Quartet. She has been a ringer in The Bronze Foundation, an auditioned community Handbell Ensemble, since 2015. Lisa has presented many Handbell workshops and video tutorials and has been a guest conductor at Ontario Handbell Festivals.

She is the vice-president of the Ontario Guild of English Handbell Ringers and the secretary of the Handbell Guilds of Canada.

Lisa is also an accomplished Soprano and has performed in operas and musicals including most recently as Miss Hannigan in *Annie*. She taught music in the school systems in Ontario for 12 years and has conducted countless choirs of all sizes and ages. For the last 11 years, she has been the conductor of the Ballantrae Adult Community Choir and more recently the Encore Choir in York Region. Lisa holds a Bachelor of Music (Music Education) and a Bachelor of Education from the University of Western Ontario as well as certificates in voice, piano, theory, counterpoint and history from the Royal Conservatory of Music.

Emily Li Handbell Association of Hong Kong

Emily Li holds a Master's degree in music, major in composition. She started ringing in 1986 and has since developed an obsession with this instrument. She received her handbell training with renowned experts on performance, conducting and composition in the United States for many years, and completed the graduate handbell program at Concordia University, Wisconsin.

Having the mission to promote handbell ringing in Hong Kong, Emily founded the Hong Kong Handbell Academy in 2004 with aims to provide handbell resources and proper training for the young generations. She founded the Handbell Association of Hong Kong and organized the annual Hong Kong Handbell Festival since 2006. At present, she is the Artistic Director of the Academy, Chairperson of Handbell Association of Hong Kong, Director of the Hong Kong Youth Handbell Ensemble and the principal guest conductor for Ministry of Bellz in Singapore. Emily believes that a solid foundation is essential in handbell training of all ages. She particularly loves nurturing youngsters holistically through ringing. Her youth ensemble has performed around the world. She served as the clinician and massed ring conductor at the 15th, 16th, and 17th International Handbell Symposia in Liverpool, Korea, and Vancouver, and the International Conductor for the Youth Festival in Cairns in 2018.

Emily is a published composer and handbell soloist. She performed as a handbell soloist at the National Seminar concert (Cincinnati, 2012) and served as the director of the Hong Kong Youth Handbell Ensemble at the Final Concert (Portland, 2013), director of the All Stars Choir (Atlanta, 2014) and Distinctly Teen (Grand Rapids, 2017).



Damien Lim Handbell Ringers of Singapore

Trained in the Yamaha Electone and Concert Percussion, Damien is the Founder and Music Director of the awardwinning MINISTRY OF BELLZ (MOB) from Singapore and Executive Director of the Handbell Ringers of Singapore (HRSG). Percussion and Handbells has led him to perform, teach and conduct in more than 20 countries, including USA, UK, Japan, Brunei, Australia, Canada, Egypt, Turkey, Ireland and France.

Damien advocates the importance of quality teaching/ learning/performance and enjoyment in music-making in today's 21st century handbell ringing. He is also a Fellow (FRSA) with the Royal Society of the Arts (UK) and a Fellow (FLCM) of the London College of Music (UK). In addition to the MOB, he directs the handbell teams at 6 high and junior schools and is consultant to 8 other school ensembles in Singapore. He also enjoys working with children with special needs, persons with disabilities and the elderly. More recently, Damien's interest in online teaching and sound and technology, led him to research on the "Efficacy of Teaching Music Online: Pedagogy and Technology". In addition to music, he spends his time on producing stage shows and online live streams. Damien enjoys travelling and eating, in addition to "musicking".

A firm believer of self-directed learning and reflective practice, he contributes actively to the learning and enjoyment of music making in students/youths and in the development of handbell standards in Singapore. He constantly seeks to be "purposeful in pursuit of excellence in today's 21st-century handbell ringing".

Ali O'Connell Handbell Society of Australasia

Ali O'Connell rang handbells throughout high school, which led her to the misapprehension that handbells were a popular and common instrument in Australia. In the subsequent decades, she has been dedicated to the continued sustainability of the art form, directing the handbell programs at St Andrew's School and Pulteney Grammar School, and establishing and leading Synergy Handbell Ensemble and the South Australian Youth Handbell Ensemble.

Ali is dedicated to excellence in music education and the transformative power that group music-making can bring to the life of everyone, but especially young people. She has been honored to be a conductor and clinician at national and international events, and for several years, to serve as an adjudicator at the Singapore Youth Festival Arts Presentation.



Toshikazu Yoshida Handbell Ringers of Japan

Toshikazu Yoshida graduated with an orchestral conducting degree from the Toho Gakuen School of Music, Tokyo Japan. He studied piano under Shiki Sekiya as well as conducting under the late Shunsaku Tsutsumi and Kazue Kamiya.

He has been appointed as conductor for a number of professional orchestras and is one of the very rare handbell conductors with orchestral conducting background. From this experience, he has arranged/composed many handbell compositions transcribing from the original orchestra scores and are published in both Japan and the US. In 1992, he conducted the Kinjo Gakuin University Handbell Choir, premiering his arrangement for handbells of P. Tchaikovsky's 'Valse des Fleurs' at the 5th International Handbell Symposium at Edmonton, Canada.

He has been the conductor for the Kinjo Gakuin University Handbell Choir, the first university handbell choir in Japan, since 1987. He also conducts his handbell choir, PRIME, and is music director/conductor for the Nagoya City University Alumni Symphony Orchestra, Meijyo University Orchestra, and the Kinjo Gakuin University Orchestra.

Jeong Soon Park Korea Handbell Association

Jeong Soon Park currently serves as the vice president of the Korea Handbell Association and as a lecturer in the association and holds Master's degree in performing arts and opera conducting. She is a conductor for the Solideo Elder's Choirchime Choir and for the Agape Handbell Choir. She teaches handbells in elementary, middle, and high schools, and is a handbell instructor at Jeju Multicultural Arts School.

She served as a conductor for handbell choirs at Presbyterian and Methodist churches, and currently teaches at Jangseok Church.

She conducted massed ringing at 2012 International Handbell Symposium in Liverpool, UK, and served as the Preparations Committee Chairman for the 16th International Handbell Symposium in Jeju, South Korea.

Through many performances at regular concerts, schools, hospitals, social welfare facilities, churches, she workes tirelessly for the continuous growth of the Korea Handbell Association and for a strong future of Handbell music.



William A. Payn Handbell Musicians of America

As music director and conductor of Pennsylvania's Susquehanna Valley Chorale for over twenty years, one of Bill Payn's major contributions to the Susquehanna Valley has been consistent quality performances enriched by a balance of traditional classical music with innovative new choral/orchestral works.

He has "raised the bar" for introducing inventive and unique programming with a vision to inspire and engage audiences of all ages.

With over 50 compositions to his credit, Payn's choral and handbell works represent distinctive, original music performed regularly through-out the world in major church and concert venues.

In 2016, he retired as former chair of the music department, professor of music, and director of choral studies at Bucknell University where he led his choirs to international recognition. His Emmy-nominated Bucknell Candlelight Christmas production continues to be aired every holiday season on public television throughout the U.S.

Payn received a bachelor's degree in church music/ organ from Westminster Choir College and master's and doctorate in organ and harpsichord from West Virginia University. In 2016, Bucknell University (through the generosity of Robert and Natalie Rooke) honored him with the William A. Payn Scholarship, an endowment fund that annually provides full tuition to a talented and promising incoming music student. He also was presented recently with the Elaine Brown Award for Choral Excellence by the American Choral Directors Association for outstanding lifelong work in the choral arts.



Stephanie Rhoades Handbell Musicians of America

Stephanie Rhoades is Conductor and Artistic Director of Concert Bells of Fort Worth, an auditioned community ensemble established in 1998. She is also Coordinator of Music and Worship and Handbell Director at Preston Hollow Presbyterian Church in Dallas, Texas.

With a reputation as an effective and engaging teacher, she has been a clinician and guest director for numerous workshops and festivals across the US. She recently conducted two events for Handbell Musicians of America: the All-Star choir at National Seminar in 2018 and Distinctly Bronze East in 2020. She has been Chair or President of several local and national organizations and recently served for six years as a Member-At-Large on the National Board of Handbell Musicians of America.

She holds a BA degree in music from Yale University and a Master of Sacred Music degree from Southern Methodist University's Perkins School of Theology. She is a certified personal trainer and enjoys cycling, training for triathlons, and scuba diving.



Alex Guebert

Symposium Choir Conductor Handbell Musicians of America

Alex Guebert is a composer, arranger, clinician, percussionist, music director and music teacher from Orange, California. He leads three advanced-level handbell groups: Cathedral Bells of St. John's Lutheran Church in Orange, L.A. Bronze, and Concert Handbells at Concordia University Irvine.

Alex's award-winning handbell compositions and arrangements have been published and performed nationwide and overseas. His compositional style is a result of his background as a percussionist, his love of film and video game score, and his desire to broaden the horizons of handbell repertoire.

Alex holds an M.M. in Music Composition from Cal State Long Beach, where his graduate recital featured a 25-minute work for handbells, strings, and percussion. Some of Alex's most recent forays into the national scene of handbells include teaching classes at Handbell Musicians of America national and local seminars and leading several mass ring events.

Alex lives in Orange with his wife, Heather, who works as a scientist in the Orange County Crime Lab, and baby daughter, Emma Joy, who shares her dad's love of music and her mom's scientific curiosity about the world.

Workshop & Showcase Descriptions

WORKSHOPS

Basic Weaving Techniques

Beth Ann Edwards – US Tuesday, August 2: 11:50 am – 12:50 pm

Learn or review weaving techniques for those times when you are assigned more than two bells. You will be shown how to determine the best weaving method for each situation and how to mark your scores effectively. This workshop includes practice time for weaving with handbells as the ringer learns to handle key changes and accidentals.

The **BASSics**

Nick Hanson – US Wednesday, August 3: 12:00 pm – 1:00 pm

Ringing on the low bass handbells (2s and 3s) requires very specific approaches in regards to physical health, proper ringing technique, the execution of other techniques, and assignments and setups. Being a foundational course, this class will focus primarily on the absolute beginning of bass handbell ringing, up to and including assignment ideas for level 1 and 2 handbell music. Mallets are required – bring your own!

Bell Trees – An Overview

Barbara Brocker – US Tuesday, August 2: 11:50 am – 12:50 pm

This class with begin with a 20-minute video presentation of the overview of bell trees as they have been performed in a multitude of ways. It will be followed by looking at music and listening to recordings (and videos) of the future direction of bell trees.

Bell Trees – Build and Play

Barbara Brocker – US Wednesday, August 3: 12:00 pm – 1:00 pm

In small groups around a bell tree stand, you'll build a bell tree and play it! Groupings are: (1) Bell Trees In the Beginning (for those who have never played a bell tree), (2) Bell Tree with Bell Choir Music (for those who have played a bell tree and want to experience the new bell-tree-withbell-choir music), (3) Playing with 4 mallets (learn how to hold them and play part of a piece).

Bountiful Battery

Debbie Rice – US Thursday, August 4: 12:15 pm – 1:15 pm

Making music from the middle requires changing bells with efficiency, weaving multiple bells, highlighting melodies under the treble, functioning as harmony and melody within the same measure or phrase, building dynamic accompaniment and resolving dissonance. This session will explore the musical power the bountiful battery can provide.

Canadian Folk Songs

Patsy Andrews-Vert – Canada Thursday, August 4: 12:15 pm – 1:15 pm

This workshop will allow participants to sight read a new collection of Canadian Folk Songs arranged for handbells/ handchimes by Canadian arranger and composer, Craig Cassails. This collection was published in the Fall of 2021 and features Level 2-3, 3 octave arrangements of Canadian Folk song from all over Canada. Come on a journey to Canada, complete with pictures, maps, and music!

Cantonese 101

Bellaholics – Hong Kong Friday, August 5: 11:45 am – 12:45 pm

Cantonese seem so difficult and complicated to you? Learn some everyday phrases that you can use when you meet a Cantonese speaker or when you visit Hong Kong! There are over 80 million native Cantonese speakers worldwide, so you will always be able to use it!

Conducting as a Facilitator

William Payn – US Wednesday, August 3: 12:00 pm – 1:00 pm

Dr. Payn has been teaching HMA Masterclasses for nearly two decades. His discussion for this class will include hands-on work with volunteers from the class. The class focus will center around gesture and the role that appropriate, clear conducting plays – allowing the ringers to produce a musical and expressive sound. This is not a 'beginning techniques' class. The assumption will be that participants have knowledge of basic conducting skills and are looking for unique ways to 'facilitate' musical performances. Creative Use of Handchimes

This class will cover techniques that can be used for both handbells and handchimes, techniques specific to handchimes, and a newer technique that has only been used a few times before! In addition, we will use music written for handbells that can also be applicable for handchimes.



History of IHS and IHC

A Brief History of the International Handbell Symposium

The history of the International Handbell Symposium dates back to August 1982 when David R Davidson (then president of the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers AGEHR) attended the National Handbell Workshop hosted by the Handbell Ringers of Japan (HRJ). During his visit as guest clinician, a need for an international gathering of handbell ringers was suggested. He, together with Kazuo Ohta (board member HRJ) and Sun-Joo Shin (then deputy secretary HRJ) decided to create the International Handbell Symposium where handbell ringers from all over the world can gather to participate and exchange cultures through the 'art of handbell ringing'.

The principal purpose for the International Handbell Symposium was to promote the flourishing of communication between nations, the spreading of handbells as art, and to extend the spirit of world peace through music.

The first International Handbell Symposium was held from 13th to 17 August, 1984 at the Humboldt State University, Arcata, California. It has been held every two years since then. The first round of events were in Gotemba, Japan in 1986, Exeter, England in 1988, Seoul, Korea in 1990, Edmonton, Canada in 1992 and Adelaide, Australia in 1994. The event has attracted some 600-800 participants from all over the world.

The committee is made up of the presidents and other representatives of the seven guilds that currently share in hosting the event – The Handbell Ringers of Japan, The Handbell Society of Australasia, The Korean Handbell Association, Handbell Musicians of Canada, The Handbell Ringers of Great Britain, The Handbell Association of Hong Kong, Handbell Ringers of Singapore, and Handbell Musicians of America.
